Ken and Dee Pannabecker, longtime members of LGC, are finishing up their time with MMAP. which they began in January of 2001. What is MMAP?

It stands for Mobile Missionary Assistance Program. It is an organization begun, almost casually, in the late 70's. Some retire folk with RVs were moved to serve with their construction and other skills at

Christian organizations (churches, camps, missions, orphanages, etc.) who might otherwise not be able to afford the assistance.

Through a well defined system of communications, MMAPers can choose the months they are available, as well as request in which of six regions they would like to work.

Each couple is joined by at least two other RVing MMAP couples on each job. The jobs run three weeks, four work days per week, seven hours per day.

The wives are not "required" to contribute labor, but often get involved as "road angels" in other ways.

Ken and Dee began and are ending their work at Mount Gilead Camp near Sebastopol. On that first outing, they were working with eight other couples. They have returned to that site more than any other.

They have also served in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Michigan and Texas, and as far as Richmond, Indiana, near the Ohio border! They were sometimes able to combine their volunteer work with visiting friends and family near the sites, or on their way to and from them.

Ken's expertise as a cabinet maker was often a boon to those sites fortunate to receive his help. He soon learned to carry along his specialized tools, as he was nearly certain to need them!

Ken reports that they always arrived with a general idea of what sort of work needed to be done, but that emergencies, or the arrival of just the right set of skills, trumped original plans.

A common MMAPers' saying comes from repeated experience with God's sovereignty and grace. "God gets the right people to the right places at the right time!

Ken and Dee are not LGC's first MMAPers. Dan and Shirley Bartel and Leonard and Jean Bartel are faithful servants who helped lead the way.

The Pannabeckers were thanked in church recently for their faithful service on 41 MMAP projects.
